LOTUS



When Lotus opens on the Piazza, it will bring a refreshing and imaginative twist to the classic British curry house and individuals or dining groups will be part of the 'small plate/sharing plate revolution'. Rather than ordering his or her own meal with separate courses (starters and main), diners will be encouraged to choose several small dishes of food from which they help themselves or, if dining with others, share. This dining style is a proper reflection of how Indians themselves eat with sharing of food a common practice. Most dishes will be small portion size so diners can try four or five dishes for the price of one 'traditional' main course portion. There will also be half a dozen curries on the menu at a slightly higher price to reflect a larger serving.

The cooking will be very traditionally Indian - authentic versions of classic dishes with family favourites, street food staples, chaat and each curry cooked from scratch with its own spices and favours giving individual integrity. You will be offered a wide selection of vegetarian and nonvegetarian food on a short, well-ordered menu which will change and develop over time.

You can choose whether to eat with cutlery (spoons) or, as most Indians do, with the tips of your fingers. These are certainly more convenient for eating flat breads (naan, roti and chapati) and small plates and there's an art to making a boat-like shape with the flatbread so they can scoop sauces, gravies and curries without letting them run onto your fingers!



The planning and research behind Lotus has been very careful and thorough. UK's 'small plate' revolution began in London and is spreading through other cities. Having visited many of the



restaurants and cafés – particularly in London – it was clear Lotus couldn't just be an imported look from London. It had to be something that would work here, that

couldn't just be an imported look from London. It had to be something that would work here, that was sympathetic to the local culture and environment and still offered an authenticity of flavours and an authenticity of dining style.

The general atmosphere will be more relaxed and café-like with stripped wood tables, cutlery put in containers, a décor that reflects the semi-rural setting, natural materials and stone, neutral/pastel colours with fabric and antique artefacts brought over from Rajasthan. The open kitchen will allow diners to watch the chefs at work. There will be a well-stocked, large bar with classic Indian lagers, six draught beers, ale from Derbyshire micro-breweries, soft drinks and a wide variety of cocktails with an Indian twist.

Opening in the middle of June from 11am to 11pm with around 120 covers which could expand to the outside space overlooking at the Marina when the weather allows, Lotus will happily cater for everything from a single person coming in for a glass of sparkling water to a group of 30 arriving

for their Christmas Party. Locals can set up an account and have a preferred take-out order which can be phoned in and then picked up. There is a genuine intention to be flexible and respond to the wishes of the clientele. Indeed, some exploring is going on as to whether there would be a demand from the local community for breakfast – again traditional street food recipes.

Lotus is a hugely attractive new addition to the Marina. It will have a menu priced to encourage everyone (the 'small/sharing' plates from around £3 or £4 each and the slightly larger portion size curry at £6 or £7 each), a décor which is relaxed and interesting, an ordering and eating style which will encourage conversation and informality, a series of new authentic taste sensations and a take-out option which will be attractive to us all.

We wish Sunny Chandhoke, his brother Harcharan Chandhoke, Sanjeev Kumar the very best of luck in this new venture and we welcome Vid Patel (owner of Kinara in Willington) as General Manager.

Congratulations to Janis and Howard who pleasure fished, with Howard landing a nice 3lb carp (see picture). It was a good effort by the Marina group as the pro anglers in the lake behind were coming in with similar weights. We are preparing for the first home match on the 29th of April for club members. It should be a good session as there are lots of fish moving about and at last the carp are back. The 28th of July will be the Neil Wakeham memorial match held at Longford. We have 20 pegs booked but space for 30. It will cost £20 for your day fishing; £10 will go to Macmillan Cancer Support, the other £10 for the match entrance fee and full cooked breakfast. Mercia's Winter Weather (plus April!)



We've had the Met Office weather station in place for just over a year now with the team taking daily readings sun, rain, cloud cover, air and ground temperatures. Looking

back over the twelve months (thanks to Dave Smith) we can report that overall we had 1,440.2 hours of sunshine - which was 16.7 hours more than the UK 10 year average. On the 19th of June last year we had 14 hours of sunshine! July had below average sunshine and above average rainfall and the year was wetter than the average. For those who might like sleeping outside, February was colder than normal and it was -6 on the 28th of February. The best month to be out and about was April last year -177.5 hours of sunshine compares to the average of 144 hours and only 13.6mm of rain compared to the month's average of 48.9mm.

April last year was beautiful so let's compare the first 13 days of April 2017 to the same in April 2018. In 2017 it only rained on one of those days (1.5mm). This year it rained on 9 of the days with a total of 61.9mm. Last year 87.2 hours of sun in thirteen days of April This year? We only had 19.6.hours. And who can forget our deluge on 13th March -22.8mm (a third of the month's average rainfall). We feed the data directly into the Met Office databank and, of course, have the data available for us here on site. It's an interesting browse because while not forecasting, it provides useful statistics and as the years go by, we'll be that much more able to report on our local weather.

Rachel and Thomas - New Arrivals



Rachel, Thomas and Layla (seen below happily bouncing round the field!) arrived at Mercia with their new-to-them narrowboat in the middle of March. Rachel was amazed it was that recent - she feels like she's been here forever! Buying the boat and moving on as liveaboards was not a sudden impulse but rather a combination of changes in family circumstances, not seeing a way of getting onto the bricks and mortar property ladder and both loving boats, water and the outside environment. This was their chance to live together in their own home.

They are both local, so Mercia is ideally placed for both their work and keeping in regular touch with families. They were frequent visitors to the Marina and were building their 'wish list' spec for a boat they could afford - knowing it would be a bit of a project but neither of them are afraid of some hard work. One standout wish for Rachel was a kitchen/ galley with lots of working space and surfaces. So, as they travelled the

marinas viewing boats and searched online, they were more than prepared when 'their' boat leaped out at them (and it has amazing worktop space in the galley - more, Rachel says, than in her Dad's three bedroom house!). The design of the boat, too, pleased them - the 20-year-old, 61' trad stern shell having bulkheads dividing the space well and giving a feeling of lots of rooms and lots of space. There is work aplenty for them to do - replacing the stove, the floor and they know as they do one thing, three or four more will add themselves to the list!

Their boat came from Whilton Marina so Thomas and his friend, Darren, brought it up to Mercia through the mini-beast from the East with no heating. For some five or six days they slept fully clothed in sleeping bags - a spartan and tough trip. But this, and all the work they are now beginning, will give them invaluable knowledge about their boat and boats in general. Thomas has watched videos, read a huge amount and - with a fair amount of experience at practical work - is both enthusiastic and realistic. They already know of the help and advice this community is ready to offer and will take any and all contributions!



They both work, so need to fit boat work around their jobs. Thomas is at Five Lamps Derby whilst pursuing an acting career; Rachel has three significant commitments - supporting her Dad by doing his shopping and providing other care, doing office and admin work for the King's Crescent development in Derby and working with the community interest non-profit company founded by her and her friend Annie Fielder six years ago. Whiffle Pig (whifflepig.com) runs creative therapy workshops in hospitals and care homes (including, recently, her Dad's home), providing support to adults and children. Do look at the website to get a better idea of their work - justice can't be done by a quick sentence here.

They are delighted with their life at Mercia. Layla, too, has settled in happily even though this has all been very new to her - the movement and noises on a boat, the community (dogs and human!), the multitude of smells. Rachel particularly loves the Facilities Block and its cleanliness; she never fails to thank the team when she sees them. Both of them love the community, the people, the atmosphere, the environment and the wildlife. Every morning they wake up, look at where they live, listen to the early morning sounds, think of the day ahead and as they say - "it just puts a smile on your face".
