How safe is your boat?

E very now and then there's a shout out on the Mercia Community Facebook page for a BSS Examiner.

It's really important to know that if you are a residential moorer, you <u>must</u> meet certain conditions if your boat is to pass its BSS. To clarify these, Graham Watts, the BSS Manager of the Boat Safety Scheme, responded to our questions as follows:

Why are there complicated rules meaning only some BSS Examiners can check residential boat gas systems?

It's part of the Health & Safety Executive's Gas Safety rules. The rules mean that for liveaboard boats (and hire boats and other commercial boats), only a qualified Gas Safe registered engineer can work on the gas system and the definition of 'work' includes checking for gas leaks using a manometer device attached to the gas pipework.

Is it recommended that boat owners fit a Bubble Tester?

Yes, fitting a Bubble Tester in the LPG cylinder locker is strongly recommended because it allows owners to check for leaks themselves and so enjoy piece of mind



in between BSS Examinations. It is very important that fitting Bubble Testers on residential boats (and private leisure boats) is done by a LPG boat-competent Gas Safe registered engineer. This is because the Bubble Tester must be correctly located and oriented, and for large volume LPG systems, the engineer may need to install a bypass arrangement to allow gas to flow past the Bubble Tester when it is not being used.

Does a Bubble Tester do away with the need for a Gas Safe registered engineer testing the gas system on residential boats? Yes, because any BSS Examiner can check for leaks using a fully functioning and appropriately located Bubble Tester. It is the case however that there is no BSS requirement for a bubble tester and so fitting one is matter of boat owner choice.

Meet Matt Franklin

att Franklin joined the Mercia Community three years ago last April. Never having even stepped onto a narrowboat, he saw the image of one moving down a canal as a backdrop to a television advertisement and was immediately certain that this was to be his future. He looked at a couple of marinas before realising his perfect marina - Mercia - was just round the corner from his (then) house. What a Scorcher!



You don't need reminding what a scorcher July was, and our local weather station, here on the marina, has recorded some interesting statistics.

The rainfall at Mercia for the whole of July was just 1.1mm. The July national average is normally 63mm. Our average daily temperature has been 25.3c, compared to a national July average of 18c, and we have enjoyed 278 hours of sunshine during July, compared to an average of 194. This period of dry, hot weather has resulted in a possible case of avian botulism in the wildlife pond (between the marina and towpath). Avian botulism outbreaks occur relatively frequently in ponds and lakes in periods when there is less oxygen in the water, such as during heat waves. The risk to health for both humans and dogs is considered to be very low.

However, for the time being it's sense to exercise caution, so please **keep your dogs on leads and do not let them go into the water.** If you see wildfowl in distress, please report it to the Marina Office and don't feed birds in the water.
