Mercians and guests celebrated our 10th Anniversary in style over the weekend of 15 & 16 September: the sun shone (well, most of the time) and the varied programme of events, which ran from midday on the Saturday included line dancing, cake baking, a boater's bonnet competition, an inaugural Mercian pantomime, a big band, a performance from the Mercian Ukulele Group, a speech from Michael Thornton and music and dancing until late.

The giant stretch tent, with its three open sides, proved popular throughout the day and moorers and lodge owners enjoyed a free barbecue and, eventually, a hog roast.

On Sunday, a dozen or so boats entertained the several thousand guests as they paraded around the marina, before cruising to Willington, many decorated especially for the occasion, with a number of 'boaters bonnets' in evidence. The weekend's events were wrapped up on the Sunday with a grand firework finale and an open air showing in the stretch marquee of 'Mamma Mia'!

Finally, after being 'under wraps' for several weeks, the bronze statue that sits at the end of the Boardwalk has been unveiled as part of the Marina's tenth anniversary celebrations. Called 'The Bird of Happiness',

it has been very well received by Mercians and the public in general. But what bird is it? Many believe it be a swan, though others are not so sure. But whatever your interpretation, it is a fine addition to the Marina.



The 'Bird of Happiness' has been created by sculptor Simon Gudgeon. His signature smooth-style concentrates itself on spirit and nature. Hailing from Yorkshire, but living and working in Dorset, Simon Gudgeon is widely regarded as one of the country's top contemporary sculptures. He says: "A sculpture, on a superficial level must encapsulate beauty; it must uplift the spirit and enhance its surroundings. But on a deeper level it should resonate with the viewer and have a subconscious appeal to their emotions. Miniature copies of the bronze are currently available to buy in the Bluebell Gallery.

STREETHAY WHARF LTD Coventry Canal Lichfield

Negotiations are now well advanced towards Streethay opening a 'satellite' engineering workshop at Mercia and, all being well, this should be in place mid-October/early November.

The plan is to have Streethay engineers based here doing repair work, electrical, solar, gas, stoves, plumbing and engineering work on both marina-based and visiting boats. Major work – such as stretching, refits, painting, boat fit-outs (yes, they do one a year with the current commission on a Tyler Wilson shell) and big engineering projects will stay at Streethay Wharf's home base. This isn't intended as a fixed arrangement – more a starting plan which can evolve and develop as the new

workshop beds in and develops. Terry and Tina Bellamy acquired Streethay Wharf in 2012 though their son Nick had been working there with Ray Bowen from some ten years before that.

Boats are in the Bellamy blood – they remember a Stewart & Lloyds Joey, then acquiring Darley with its butty Alperston which they restored followed by the Cowburn and Cowpar Starling with its LMS butty Ethel. And they have a couple of other project boats to work on when time permits! Nick's passion for boats didn't stop him picking up his B.Tech and HNC in Electronics but his focus has been the boatyard since he left school and his extensive constant working experience on countless numbers and types of

boats over the last 15 years adds hugely to Terry's own knowledge. With Tina's background in IT, education and business management they make a formidable trio.

We are indeed fortunate they are willing to bring all that expertise and experience to the Marina.

You will have questions you want to ask no doubt! More details will emerge as the next few weeks pass and they intend an evening buffet as an opportunity for an official Launch and Introduction of the Streethay Team at The Willow or Beetroot Tree (Heg Deaville has already generously said she's ready to help with that) in the near future. Watch for an announcement of that date and get your name in quickly; it will be a popular event.

Knit your poppy with pride

You have probably noticed the poppies on the signage on the main gates.

This is in conjunction with a display that the marina are planning to acknowledge the 100th year anniversary of the end of the Great War.

Pop-Up Poppy Knitting Pattern designed especially for this project

USING RED DK WOOL AND 3.75 OR SIZE 9 KNITTING NEEDLES

MAIN POPPY

CAST ON 80 STITCHES AND KNIT 2 ROWS

3RD ROW – KNIT 2 TOGETHER ACROSS ROW (40 STITCHES)

KNIT 2 ROWS

6TH ROW – KNIT 2 TOGETHER ACROSS ROW (20 STITCHES)

KNIT 2 ROWS

9TH ROW – KNIT 2 TOGETHER ACROSS ROW (10 STITCHES)

KNIT 2 ROWS

12TH ROW – KNIT 2 TOGETHER ACROSS ROW (5 STITCHES)

BREAK WOOL AND THREAD WOOL THROUGH THESE STITCHES

GATHER UP, SECURE AND SEW UP THE SIDE SEAM OF YOUR POPPY

POPPY MIDDLE

USING BLACK DK WOOL AND SAME NEEDLES

CAST ON 14 STITCHES, KNIT 1 ROW

2ND ROW – KNIT 2 TOGETHER ACROSS ROW (7 STITCHES)

BREAK WOOL AND GATHER UP THE MIDDLE INTO A ROUND SHAPE

SEW INTO THE CENTRE OF YOUR POPPY

OR FIND A NICE BLACK BUTTON INSTEAD



Marina 10mph Speed Limit:

This wonderful Boatwoman's Bonnet was made by Mary Bodman who - at 93 - is our most senior residential moorer. Mary's lifelong passion has been craft - both as a teacher and practitioner and many of us have had the privilege of seeing her outstanding quilting. She undertook the bonnet as her contribution to the Boater's Bonnet competition and reckons it took her some 70 hours to complete in all. It's left her with huge admiration for the women who made them in Victorian times since they would have been worked entirely by hand and very often by candlelight or lamps in the evening since the days would have been filled with the business of their working boats. Mary's bonnet has been entered in the Willington Arts' Festival."
