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Winterising your boat

As we approach what is normally the coldest couple of months of the year here's a quick checklist of how to be prepared for whatever Mother Nature has in store for us. This is a list for a complete close down, so you may want to cherry pick, depending on how long you might be leaving your boat for and whether you will be leaving a heater on board etc.

And please be careful out there on the pontoons. Appearances can be deceptive and just because there is not a layer of ice or frost on the pontoon boarding, does not mean that it is not extremely slippery.

Sand/Gravel is available close to all pontoons. Please help any of your neighbours who might be struggling in the conditions.

□ Check your engine coolant. If it not obvious, then drain and replace your antifreeze mix .

□ Grease exposed linkages.

□ Grease your battery main terminals. Isolate engine battery.

□ Grease stern gland.

□ BATTERIES. Let your landline do its work.

□ Ensure the bilge pump will work automatically or visit the boat to check the bilge water level.

□ Apply a light application of WD40 to vulnerable electrics (and main control panel if it is outside).

□ Grease all door hinges.

□ Drain down hot water heaters and leave drain plugs out.

□ Drain down central heating (or calorifier) or make sure indirect heating water has anti-freeze.

□ If possible, close main water tank stopcock, pump out remaining water and turn pump off.

□ Leave taps open and turn off water pump.

□ Make sure the shower drain pump is run immediately before you leave and there is no water left in pipes.

□Remove all perishable food and rat treats.

□ Remove plants.

Leave all cupboards open for flow of air.

□ Leave fridge door open.

□ Remove as many textiles as possible or store hanging in free air.

□ Turn off gas.

□ Turn off main electric (excluding automatic bilge pump).

□ Try and keep diesel tank as full as possible to prevent water condensation.

□ Install a couple of tube heaters or an oil-filled radiator on thermostatic switches.

□ Talk to your neighbours and swap telephone numbers.
