ollowing the public consultation on proposed changes to the Boat Safety Scheme (BSS) which took place this autumn, the BSS Management Committee has decided that new BSS Requirements for carbon monoxide (CO) alarms on boats will be introduced from 1 April 2019.

All boats with accommodation spaces subject to the BSS will see mandatory checks introduced for suitable CO alarms in good condition and in appropriate locations. The requirements are designed to keep people on and around boats safe. As well as protection from neighbouring boats, the CO alarms are also expected to prevent death or injury to boat owners from their own boat engines or appliances. The alarms will warn



levels of CO, which can be a long-term threat to health if left undetected. The BSS will be publishing the new checks in detail over the next two months on its website.

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

Fit alarms approved as meeting BS EN 50291-2; these are best suited for boats. Alarms with life-long batters are available. If you already have a Kitemarked alarm, tested to BS EN 50201, or 50291-

Do You Need A Lift?

f you need transport to enable you to attend medical appointments etc., here are a few options available to you. South Derbyshire CVS, a voluntary organisation based in Swadlincote, coordinate a range of schemes and can help you decide which is best suited to your needs. Charges vary depending on which service you require. The minimum charge is 45p per mile plus a £2 service charge. All volunteer drivers are vetted and their vehicle documentation is monitored. They can be contacted on 01283 219761

If you need a one-off or occasional lift, there is a list in the Office of people based on the marina who may be able to help you. Alternatively Nigel Hunt has volunteered to help find a volunteer driver for such an occasion. If you give your details to the Office, they will call Nigel and ask him to call you. If you make any donation towards the cost of this lift, please remember it should not exceed 45p a mile as set by HMRC.

On the buses

A t a recent meeting with representatives from Trent Barton, and with several regular bus users from Mercia present, issues were raised and discussed about the suitability (or unsuitability!) of the new buses now being used on this route.

Trent Barton explained the yellow buses had to be taken off because of their age and the 'Solo' vehicles put in



as replacements.

The main concerns aired were about accessibility – including difficulties for those with a mobility scooter or walking aid and the steps half way up the aisle –

plus significantly reduced storage area for shopping and trolleys at the front of the bus. These issues were recognised as being major issues for a route which services predominantly rural communities with an older age group. Internal discussions have continued with Trent Barton over the last few weeks. The following email was received from Trent Barton just before New Year: "We have fed back our early days' analysis of the V3 route to the management team and we are still building an analysis of customer numbers for the service. We will be making arrangements to provide a vehicle for customers with mobility scooters to practice as promised. It is still very early days in the changes to the V3 and the brand is going from strength to strength and I am hopeful this trend will continue. The Solo SR vehicles will remain in place but we will be watching very closely to ensure that customers needs are being catered for. I hope we can keep a close working relationship."

If anyone has comments or input to make to the discussions, please do so via Jo James or the Office so that we can be sure Trent Barton is kept fully informed of their customers' views.


