# **Going for Gold**

ercia Marina has been notified of its latest achievements in the 2019-20 David Bellamy Conservation Awards. The following email arrived at the Marina:

"We are delighted to advise you that Professor Bellamy has awarded Mercia Marina the Gold accolade.

"I am really pleased to say that you are one of the first recipients of our new Going Green Together badge. Please thank everyone involved in your prizewinning project.

"Great news on the 5-in-5 habitat badge front—vou've won this year's *Woodlands* Badge. We hope you will aim for your next badge in 2020 when the focus will be on wetlands .

"In addition, well done on all the hard work you've done to help Britain's bees—I am delighted to say that you are



a Honey Bee Friendly park. "Many congratulations on

this achievement." Our first Gold Medal was awarded in 2011, the Marina's first attempt at attaining the highly soughtafter accolade and we have achieved the same

'standard each year since then. Three years ago we were, in addition, given a Special Distinction Award for the 2016 Bee Conservation Project - wonderfully



led by Jane Wakeham - and we have been accredited as a Bee Friendly Park each year since. Last year special mention was made of the work of the Volunteers involved in all the projects over the last nine years. The David Bellamy Conservation Award Scheme is one of the longest running green tourism awards in the UK.

Robert Neff and the rest of the Mercia team is delighted with this year's set of Awards. 'Many marinas and parks', he says, 'minimise the estate work (and

therefore running costs) by putting common areas under grass which looks 'green' but is not very helpful to wildlife. In



contrast, our aim has been to create diverse environments for nature. This deliberate planning has given us a wonderful variety of flora which has attracted an increasingly diverse fauna. The recognition we are receiving from David Bellamy is testament to the investment and foresight of all those involved – most notably John Thornton and David Boddy - and delivered by Stuart Reeves and the entire estates' team. And we couldn't have done it without the involvement and commitment of

the able and knowledgeable volunteers who have worked alongside - and sometimes led - us." We have been given a 'heads up' on the focus for next year's "5 in 5" badge. It's mov-

Piscatorial Society It's Pike Season!



J ust a reminderthat the pike season is now with us until March. The rules are: 1: no treble hooks please as they are banned on the marina. 2: all hooks barbless with the exception of bait hooks. 3: wire traces must be used. 4: please ensure you are using the correct tackle 12lb line as a minimum and <u>if you</u> <u>are going after the big boys</u> then you will need at least 20lb. 5: make sure that you have a landing net suitable for the species. 6: **NO** gaffs or Gaggs and you will need long forceps, long-nose pliers and even side cutters to hand.

Finally, don't forget the unhooking mat.

# `A Safe Place'



The Marina has recently signed up to this new initiative supported by Derbyshire Police, Trading Standards and the Derbyshire Learning Disabil-

ity Partnership Board. This is part of the Hate Crime/Keeping Safe initiative. A `Safe Place' is somewhere people can go if they feel scared, are lost or need help when they are out and about. They are generally public buildings, such as libraries, GP surgeries and shops. All such places display a sticker in their window so that visitors can see they are part of the scheme and let them know they can go in and ask for help if they need to.

This is an important initative and has the full support of the Marina staff. If you go in and ask for help they will: Give you somewhere safe to wait Call your family, friends or support staff Call the police or ambulance if it's an emergency.
