first got interested in the canals many moons ago in the mid-sixties. I had a stressful first job at the BBC in London and would blow off steam by walking the Regent's canal for hours. I became fascinated by the narrow boats and particularly the occasional working boat that chugged past. Old Bolinders and the like still give me a frisson. I soon discovered the locks at Hanwell (Camden was a seedy area in those days, not the trendy place it is today). The thought of traveling to faraway places by water seemed wildly romantic and still does 50 years later, though the places don't seem quite so far away.

My first forays onto the water were on old converted 70' work boats packed with rowdy drunken friends. I still have an old log book which has columns for miles traveled, locks and pints quaffed. Once, we navigated the south Stratford and got stuck under a bridge where workmen had dumped tons of bricks in the cut. Eventually, they towed us over the rubble with a dump truck. I relayed the story to the manager at Willow Wren and he said "What do you expect, trying to navigate a ditch!" For the next 15 years or so I hired boats and then used the BBC Club's boat *Alexandra Palace*. I helped commission their next boat, *Savoy Hill*, which was still around until recently when it was replaced by a new boat of the same name. Then in 1981 I left the BBC and we bummed around the world for a year before ending up in Arizona. Truly, the desert years had begun. No boats, no water. I was bereft. I consoled myself by designing my dream narrowboat in my spare time.

I retired in 2004 and took my plans to 3 builders – Stoke-on-Trent, Piper and a loner who told me to get a quote and drawings from a builder and he would build it for 25% less. Such ethics! Needless to say, the loner was a loser and I selected Piper. Simon Piper is quite a character. He was able to adapt my plan to something buildable and in 2007 *Basil*  the King was launched. Basil was my American wife's favourite cat and he thought of himself as the King of the household, so the name was my attempt to win Barb over to the watery life... Phoenix is hell in the summer and I had done my fair share of sweat labour, so for ten years we decamped to England for three months each summer and cruised the waterways aboard Basil Boat. Our first mooring was at Ventnor Farm marina which is in a fine rural setting but totally unsuitable for us because of lack of transport, shops or any nearby civilization. In 2008 I saw an ad for the new Mercia Marina and we came to have a look. Mercia was just a muddy construction site but Robert Neff inspired us with his vision of the future. We liked and trusted him immediately and booked the last end spot.

But, mindful of the nesting birds which return each spring, a gap has been left at the top of the curtaining to give them unrestricted access.
