A Discussion Piece from Peter Bentley-Hicks

t may be a strange time of year to be discussing this but as you will be aware, plans to phase out the sale of coal and wet wood for domestic burning and encouraging the use of cleaner fuels in the home were confirmed by the government on 21 February this year. Maybe this is a moment to take stock and consider whether you really need a stove to heat your boat. Maybe is there a more environmentally-friendly, cleaner and more efficient way to do it?

Diesel Central Heating:

I live on a 19.8m x 3.7m widebeam with 94 cubic meters of living space (or 65ft x 12ft and 4,025 cubic feet in old money!). The boat has a fully pressurised central heating system throughout the accommodation. It has neither a coal/wood nor diesel stove - all heating and hot water being generated by a Webasto boiler and a 1 kw fan heater set in the rear steps of the galley. Believe it or not, we can maintain a temperature of 25C even in the coldest of winters with the advantage of a gallon of hot water on tap. In 2018/19 our annual diesel heating bill was £607.00 (for 844 litres of diesel) which breaks down to £1.60 a day. You do of course have to remember to service the Webasto (usually each summer at around £200) for this to function efficiently.

The proposed red diesel changes would increase these costs but on the government website, proposed revisions to the 2020 Finance Bill include the statement that where craft have one tank for propulsion and heating the government will explore options that prevent individuals from having to pay a higher rate of duty on their heating use than they would otherwise have to pay.

The upsides of not having a stove: more living space in the saloon, no coal/wood smoke or dust in the cabin, no carbon monoxide fumes in the cabin, no need to carry or store coal and/or wood on the boat or on the roof, no danger of boat fire due to hot embers.

Electric Heating:

What if your boat doesn't have a central heating system and the stove and a gas hot water heater are it? Having spoken to a number of boaters, £30 a week on smokeless coal, logs and kindling is a pretty average spend over a 30-week autumn/winter period, making a total spend of £900, not counting any extra if summer evenings get cold. If you are a resident on the marina with access to a constant 240V 3Kw supply on the pontoons at a cost of 16p per Kw/hr, you might want to consider electric heating. A modern hot/cool air circulating fan with temperature control could warm your cabin up quickly and keep it a constant temperature.

For example, one of the new Dyson units at full power uses 2Kw/hour, automatically reducing when the living space is up to temperature. You can set a timer for the heat to go off when you go to bed and switch back on a couple of hours before you get up.

Looking at an average of 1 Kw/hr power usage during the day, from say o6oohr to 22oohrs (16 hours per day), that would equate to a cost of £2.56 per day. Over a 30-week autumn/winter period, assuming 7 days a week usage, this would cost £537.60. Not only cheaper than solid fuel but instant and considerably cleaner.

This is just to illustrate that living without a coal/wood stove doesn't have



to be a hardship and that there may actually be benefits. You could be living with cleaner air and a warm boat for less than you currently pay. Worth thinking about!

Fifty years ago, burning coal and wood was pretty much the only option but I just wanted to point out that now we have choices that could not only benefit us financially but also clean up the atmosphere and offer huge health benefits for those people with asthma or other lung conditions affected by the smoke and sulphur hanging in the air over the winter months. Collectively 500-600 bags of coal are burnt on the Marina during the winter months.

Maybe it's time to think about cleaning up our act?

Red Mason Bees

U nfortunately, it has not been a good year for our mason bees. The weather has been against them throughout. Cold after we put them out then wet and when they needed the mud we were in the middle of an extremely prolonged dry spell. The affect of this has been twofold. As

the females will reabsorb their eggs if conditions are not favourable they have fewer to lay. As they need the mud to make the cells into which they lay the eggs none or very little was available resulting in fewer eggs laid and in some cases thinner mud walls to the cells. As you look at the filled tubes in some of the nesters you may see that the mud has broken away in a few of them. It may look as if they have been predated but it is obvious that the mud was just too thin.

You will probably also notice that some of the tubes are being used by our Leafcutter Bees. This is perfectly normal and good to see. As they use leaves for their cells they are unaffected by the conditions. If you spot them working you will clearly see their abdomens are yellow, this is how they carry the pollen (see image).

The nesters will be left out for a few weeks longer and then collected in and stored until cleaning time in November. By then it is hoped that we will be able to get together to do this even if we have to have a table each to social distance.

I am sure we will have many new cocoons to clean but probably not as many as last year. Jane Wakeham
