A Selection of Forum Issues

Boardwalk Development: Behind schedule by two weeks but coming along well. All but two of the shop units now spoken for. The Festival Weekend (October 11 & 12) to celebrate the opening of the new development will include Fireworks, a band, street performers and a variety of stalls. Fire Wardens: The Office would still like to hear from anyone interested in being part of the Fire Warden team. Further information is available, so call in and talk to Jules if you would like to know more. Residential Moorings: Anyone wanting to

take up a residential moorings needs to be in touch with the Office <u>now</u>. All paperwork for the boat must be in order and arrangements for the payment of the first year's fee need to be made.

Landlines to Boats: Installing landlines to bollards is impractical. There is a substantial capital cost and the internet service at the Marina will be poor - BT Infinity is not in the area and it was the slow broadband speed that had the Marina getting w3z WiFi installed. If boaters or lodge owners find the internet speed slow, the signal may be boosted with an external WiFi aerial connected to an internal WiFi router. This equipment is available from Solwise for £70. It has worked very well so far. If you're interested and could do with some help, get in touch with Wynne (via Jo). A new w3z mast is due to go up at the end of AABB Pontoon soon; this should give a stronger signal to boats moored towards the middle of the Marina.

Elsan: The original Elsan will be refurbished shortly, including a new shed. It is planned to keep disruption to a minimum; moorers are reminded that there is the new Elsan on the other side of the Marina to be used while the refurbishment is going on.

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Volunteer Lock Keepers

Canal & River Trust will soon be recruiting new Volunteer Lock Keepers. They provide

Primary school pupil Daisy Gilman has



beaten all-comers to win the overall prize at Mercia Marina's annual art competition organised in conjunction with Willington Arts Festival.

At just 11 years old, Daisy was the youngest artist to enter this year's competition, yet she also bagged

the most public votes for her pencil drawing of a family of ducks on the water at Mercia Marina, near Willington. People were invited to submit entries in any creative medium for the theme 'Anything that Floats'. Public votes for category winners were then cast during South Derbyshire's Willington Arts Festival on May 17-18, where all entries were displayed.

Daisy, who said she had been drawing ever since she could remember, said: "I was speechless. Winning was such a shock and an amazing feeling. I'm so happy to win and really excited about my future."

She said that she could see herself eventually pursuing a career in design or fashion. "My mum's an artist and a huge inspiration - as is my dad and the whole family. My older brother works in design, so I guess it runs in the family." Daisy's dad, Dave Gilman, is a moorer at Mercia Marina, while her mum, Deborah Gilman, lives in nearby Bretby.

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The Bookshop that Floated Away by Sarah Henshaw

Sarah Henshaw opened her Book Barge in 2009. The book, published in April, tells the story of the last five years - most notably the Great Adventure of 2011, when Sarah went on a six-month 1,000 mile cruise of the waterways. She made a meagre living from her fledgling but delightful business and with a boat with no kitchen, bathroom

or loo (no pump-out/ cassette discussion for her!) she bartered books for these things as she went along. To attract customers to her planned stops, she advertised her whereabouts on Twitter and Face-



book (you'll find her active on both), asking for food, fuel or the use of a shower and giving people stories in return. With family and friends backing up at time, it worked! Of course there were dramas, boat breakdowns, high days and low days, good weather and bad weather - just as all boaters experience when they go cruising. But, despite (perhaps because of) the added pressure of life on a shoestring, Sarah's book is funny, honest and a good read (she is/was a journalist and has a passion for literature). It's on Amazon, but - much better and in line with her campaign to save independent bookshops - find her at Barton Marina and buy the book (as well as a couple of others). It's a delightful read.
