Marina Development The Promontory:

As reported last month, there is a revised plan for the promontory. There will be a Bar/ Bistro with indoor and outdoor seating, retail units and office space. The interest in the units is good and a good quality experienced operator for the Bar/Bistro has approached the Marina. The farm shop is still keen as is another operator. The portents are are therefore good and the plan is still to begin construction in October this year for a grand opening in Spring 2014.

Plans and more details are available from Robert if anyone would like to know more. The Marina Partners believe this "Phase I" development will be of a real benefit to the Marina, moorers and lodge owners and the comments being made round and about are overwhelmingly positive.

Current Promontory Residents

The Promontory is currently being well used by wildlife. The Oystercatchers hatched four

chicks in the mid May and, just before they left the nest, they were ringed by Michael and Rose. Last year and the



year before, the adult birds lost their eggs, so this is their first set of chicks at Mercia. It won't be easy to keep all

four safe; we can help them, other nestlings and fledged young by keeping our distance

and respecting the Wildlife Area boards placed on the Marina at known nesting areas. It would be good to



have dogs on leads on the Promontory so that they don't scatter the birds and chicks. The Phase I development will still leave areas free for the birds.
