Boat Checks and Safety:

Justin, Agua Narrowboats, had some very helpful advice and tips on his blog recently. All relevant to those who may be coming down to their boats again, ready to head



out onto the cut for narrowboats a day's cruising or for longer. He was willing to have his

reminders copied to the Newsletter (thanks Justin!). It never hurts to reread things you may already know! Aqua have also got their own online Newsletter, so pay a visit to the website, read the other boating advice and news and add your name to his email list so that you'll receive his news regularly.

Ventilation: always an easy one to check and you know vents get clogged up with spider webs, dust and grease. So give them a good clean to reduce the risks of knock on effects such as mildew, not to mention carbon monoxide poisoning.

Smoke and CO Detectors: they are easy to fit and could prove life saving. Once fitted make sure you test regularly and replace batteries immediately once used. It can only save your life if it works!!

Fire extinguishers and blankets: continuing with the theme above, make sure you also have a powder extinguisher on board. The small 1kg extinguisher will last about 6-8 seconds, obviously larger ones will last longer but space maybe limiting. In addition a fire blanket may be more useful and creates less mess than a fire extinguisher, good to have both at the ready and understand how to use them.

First Aid Kit: Useful to have on board for minor accidents that may occur and keep it



well stocked. Common minor accidents on board narrowboats will be cuts, burns, bites, dust in eyes and may include falls if the stairs are steep. You


may consider getting basic first aid training. Hand gel and wipes: We all know that Weil's Disease can occur from canal water and it isn't always practical to get to the sink to wash your hands whilst managing a narrowboat through locks for example. So a small tub of hand gel or wipes to keep in your pocket will help keep your hands clean and minimise risk. Of course, maintain general hygiene rules of washing hands especially before eating food.

Sun Cream: We may have had plenty of rain but when the sun does come out it will hit

you at double strength whilst cruising on your narrowboat. So protect your skin with sun cream to reduce your chances of sunburn and long term sun damage. Use aftersun lotion if you do get caught out, but prevention is better than cure!!

Get Gas Applicances Checked Annually: make sure you get your boat's gas system checked by a Gas Safe registered engineer. To minimise the risk of leaks make sure all joints are tight, pipes, regulators and hose connections are protected as much as possible and are not damaged in any way. You may consider using a bubble leak detector in the gas bottle locker to assist with this.

Buoyancy Aids: Life jackets are now much more comfortable to wear especially the self inflating type. It's recommended that life jackets are worn when out of the cabin by single handed boaters, children and non swimmers.



Safety chat to new boaters: If you have new boaters on board it's always good to give them a quick safety brief. We do this with all our hire customers as well as emailing them the Boaters Handbook, full of useful tips and check lists.

This matter was discussed at the recent Forum Meeting because of BWML's very



recent success in obtaining residential moorings at nine of its Marinas. It was likely that Sawley's application would soon be


approved and Mercia Marina was minded to do likewise.

A pre-application for a maximum of 30% of the Marina moorings to be residential had been submitted. This was not seen as a money-making opportunity by the Marina but more a way of offering additional facilities and maintaining the Marina's competitive position. Council tax would be paid as part of that status but, based on a composite rate, this was likely to be under £50 per boat. There was still a great deal of detail to be worked through but Robert Neff wanted this to be seen as a potential benefit to moorers.

Promontory Update



The Marina Partners have been approached by a possible Operator for the Bar/Bistro. The discussions are positive and, assuming all goes ahead, they would run this area as they see fit subject to some restrictions imposed by the marina and based on their considerable experience from other establishments. Potential tenants for the retail units remain keen to be involved.

The building contract is ready to go and, provided the financial side is finally agreed (bearing in mind that the economic outlook remained less than positive), work could start in October/November.

Fire Safety on Boats

The evening at the very end of May was a useful couple of hours. Kate McLaughlin, Community Fire and Safety Officer, talked about Fire Safety in general and several points are, of course, relevant to boaters: •Check Smoke and CO Alarms regularly •Get Out, Stay Out, Call the Fire Service • Keep Escape Routes Clear At All Times In the discussion which followed, several more safety points and 'advisories' were added to the list.: check people are safe



and make appropriate calls; if possible, lose the boats around the 'fire' boat. That one needs to stay moored so the Fire Services can deal with it. Make sure someone goes to the main gate to direct TALK IN THE WILLOWS 318T MAY the Fire Services. And, in terms of your boat's

doors, ensure they can be unlocked from inside. Don't have one of your two main exits barred because the door is locked from the outside. Finally have a powerful torch and phone to hand for any occasion you may need to leave your boat at night in a hurry.
