Did You Know?

A thoroughly enjoyable book by Edward Garner yields countless fascinating facts and bits of history on each and every page. The Seven Canals of Derbyshire tells the story of our canals, the three great canal

architects and designers who



came from - or came to live in - Derbyshire (James Brindley, Benjamin Outram and William Jessop) and the Cromford and High Peak Railway, a unique British railway. Industrial expansion around Manchester, the vast limestone deposits in North Derbyshire, the coalfields and the factories of the East Midlands all needed connecting. The Trent and Mersey Canal can did that, but it was 135 miles. A direct tram or rail link would only be some 40 miles. Initial thinking was for a canal link but each proposed route was dismissed and sidelined. In 1824, the tramway (the Cromford & High Peak Railway) was agreed.

It was the only railway ever built to link one canal with another and, several of its turns and twists and steep inclines were unique in the British rail system. With its summit at Ladmanlow a 1,000ft climb from Cromford, it was also one of the highest railways in Britain. When only horses were used, it would take two days to travel from



one end of the railway to the other. With the coming of the steam locomotive, this was cut to six hours.

The chief engineer for the project, Josias Jessop, was the son of William Jessop. The Peak District Planning Board and DCC bought the track bed in 1971 and it is now the High Peak Trail - hugely popular with walkers, cyclists and horse riders. Along the route are lots of reminders of the old

railways - abandoned kilns, stonework walls, an engine house at Middleton Top and the bridges and tunnels. The High Peak Junction Workshop and



Visitor Centre is open every day through the summer.
