## Feed the Birds (but not with white bread)

It's important to support wildlife through a hard winter. But it's equally important to give the right sort of food. Water birds, in

particular, can fend for themselves and don't really require human handouts to survive. White bread really is the



worst possible food to give. It has little nutritional value and fills them up to they stop feeding on the leaves, seeds and aquatic plants that make for a natural healthy diet. And white bread is now linked to growth deformities such as Angel's Wing. So feed by all means but go for corn, birdseed, mealworms, grapes (cut in half), chopped greens or duck pellets.

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
