## **IWA Cressy Award Best Residential Boat**

Six years ago, David and Angela knew nothing about narrowboats and had never been



on one. This time last vear. with David retiring and Angela giving up her job, they moved onto their new boat. In

the intervening time, they bought a boat from Alan Dinott at Ilkeston, moved it to Mercia after a two-day Helmsman's Course and - to get themselves and the boat ready for the big change - made the seven-hour round trip from Norfolk each weekend for three years. At last month's National IWA Festival they (and Norfolk Belle) won the Cressy Award for the Best Residential Boat at the Festival. Quite a time of it then!

The Award was given with no explanation of why Norfolk Belle won, but David and Angela did pick up on approving noises and favourable eyes being cast here and there as the judging was taking place. Not



that they set out to create an awardwinning boat; their sole intention was to create a 'home'. So whilst - they say - the boat may not suit others, it folds itself beautifully around them, their lives, their likes and dislikes and it has everything they need. The feeling of space is helped by a light and airy décor, the curtains changing to a softer material and colour in the summer and an open hatch.

Norfolk Belle is a 57' cruiser stern with lots of clever storage areas. The galley (cooker, sink, fridge, washing machine ) is on one side at the front opposite a single Pullman dinette (which converts to a single bed).



This gives them a table/ desk without interfering with the flow through to the salon. Leather recliners and stools, small tables, bookcases, a TV and Morso Squirrel stove create a comfortable relaxing area.

Between that space and the bathroom there is room for a wonderful glass cabinet with ornaments and keepsakes. The bath-

room has a roomy walk-in shower and a vacuflush toilet and beyond that the bedroom has an in-line double bed - long enough for 6' David and a side extension to give them 5' across. The cupboards make full use of the space under and behind the fitted furniture and Angela's use of clear

plastic storage containers makes everything easily accessible. There are plenty of bespoke touches – a water -saving shower head, David's 'tool shed' under the dinette, a 130w solar panel, LED lights throughout and a so-



phisticated battery monitor. The squirrel stove has a temperature gauge for optimum use of fuel. Non-slip tread on the steps, battery-powered candles, CO detectors, fire blankets and fire alarms (with integral lights) and both solid and rescue ladders keeping safety high on the agenda. They've still got room for the equipment and materials associated with their hobbies and interests – Nordic walking, music (the keyboard slides neatly into its own space), jewellery making, knitting and art. With David's background in agriculture and machinery, he and his toolbox take care of the engine and most other jobs around the boat when they arise. The cratch holds the bicycles and a trolley but is free of clutter! It's a very comfortable 'easy' boat; it has a lovely feel to it. And maybe that homely atmosphere, more than anything, earned Norfolk Belle its recent accolade.
