#### RECYCLING

Jude Cleary, who has made a big contribution to the Marina's recycling programme, asks everyone to treat the recycling area with care and avoid being lazy. At least once a week she takes glass bottles from the same orange bins and put them in the designated bottle bins (also removing the plastic bags that people put the bottles in in and putting them back in the orange recycling bins). ii) Tom off NB *Amanda* has been nominated for his prompt action and help for a neighbouring boater. The neighbour was working on his boat when an engine battery exploded causing some cuts and burns from the acid. Tom went to his aid and drove him to hospital.

They have assessed bikes gifted by the Marina and others and advised on roadworthiness, giving substantial amounts of their time as well as their expertise to ensuring the scheme was launched successfully and now continuing their involvement as the scheme is evidently popular and well used.

## A DRY DOCK EXERCISE WITH DERBYSHIRE FIRE & RESCUE SERVICE



Mercia is committed to demonstrating responsibility and care for all marina users and working with the emergency services is a core part of that policy. On 27th August, three fire appliances from Kingsway and Normanton Road Fire Stations came to do an exercise in the Dry Dock having been invited to do so by the marina. Red Watch from Kingsway had been to visit to plan the exercise; the Nottingham Road crew had not been to the site before and all they knew was that it was a drill.

The purpose of the exercise was to see how they would approach and deal with unconscious casualties on board a boat while the dock was drained. The scenario was that there were two boat owners on the boat and one was working on the engine. A bang was heard from the outside of the dock and a plume of smoke was seen to rise out of the open end of the dock.



The crew from Nottingham Road arrived after being called by Red Watch, who were already on-site as they had set up the scene. We looked on helpless as the Nottingham Road crew drove straight into the marina and then between the Boardwalk and Midland Chandlers. That reinforced the need for giving the 999 control full instructions for getting to the area they are needed, making sure that if they need to come through the security gates they must be told to turn left at the mini roundabout by the entrance. Emergency vehicles can always access the secure area as there is an emergency services button which rings through to a controller who can open the gate remotely. This is strictly for the emergency ambulance, fire service and police use only but everyone should be aware that emergency services can get into the marina, even if nobody is at the gate to open it.



Once the additional crew had got round to the Dry Dock they grouped to find out what was known about the incident. A member of the Nottingham Road crew coordinated the response. Jules Aucott acted as the person who had made the 999 call and gave them the information about the bang and smoke. The whiteboard on the outside of the dry dock showed that two people had stayed onboard overnight.



The crew asked about the layout of the dock, if there was gas and where the electricity could be isolated before entering the building. Two teams then put on protective gear and inserted opaque film into the inside of their visors to emulate working in a smoke filled area.

It was fascinating to watch the teams work as a unit, staying in contact with each other and following walls so that they would not get disorientated in the low visibility. They talked to each other, giving information on their surroundings and progress. They moved around the space in a way that protected the team. The person at the front would move their arm out, in front and up, checking for the room profile and hazards before walking forward. They walked down the stairs backwards - a safer position to feel that the lower step was safe. Others were carrying equipment such as a ladder and hose.



They found the edge of the boat and felt around the gunwale for the openings. One team put a ladder up at the bow and another at the stern. One member of each team ascended the ladder and felt their way to the access. They each went inside the boat and after a few minutes, emerged with a weighted dummy casualty.

Each team worked together to bring the casualty down the ladder and using the classic fireman's lift, up the stairs and out of the dock to safety.

Aside from the exercise we were able to have in depth talks with the fire personnel about the layout and systems on boats that are useful to know for the fire service. They were impressed to hear about the boat safety scheme and how we work as a community here with our fire warden and first aider volunteers.

The crews found the exercise useful and thanked Mercia for the opportunity to practice a rescue in an unusual setting. It is good that there are local crews familiar the marina and boats. The exercise reinforced the marina's decision to allow liveaboards to live aboard when doing work and the marina will:

- Make regular checks on the security of the rail around the dry dock
- Paint the step edges
- Put in hand rail on the inside wall of steps
- Regular checks for cleanliness
- Put up a notice saying only people doing the work are to go down into the dock.

The Kingsway crew were then called out to a car fire on the A38 and it was a reminder that in a real emergency we are very lucky to have such skilled and dedicated crews nearby.
