(all up to certain limits) - alternative accommodation if the boat becomes uninhabitable, lock and key replacement, insurance on portable electronic equipment (laptops, tablets, ipads, mobile phones and cameras), credit cards and cash, pedal cycles, solar panels, personal property away from the boat and there is no excess payable if the damage or loss occurs when the boat is on its permanent mooring at the Marina. On all policies, they only ask for a hull survey on a 30-year old boat and then only every five years which can be varied by two years to coincide with blacking.

They offer competitive quotes and will give a discount to Mercia Marina. They insure our boat* and a number of others here so it's an opportunity (particularly if your cover is due for renewal!) to come

CPR Training

Saturday, 29th October 7.00 - 9.00 p.m. at The Willow Tea Rooms

When Mercia received the defibrillator from the British Heart Foundation (it's mounted on the wall outside the Office), the marina undertook to train as many people as possible on CPR, which at best could save a life but will certainly give the emergency services a better chance of saving that person. We have been given DVDs to show (each lasting about 30 mins) and have dummies for people to



practice CPR. Those who attend will be supported our own First Aid team and after completing the evening they receive a certificate of attendance. The intention is to give people confidence should they ever come across someone having a heart attack as every moment counts. This evening differs from the one on First Aid and Fire Safety (which gives an



overview of first aid, common injuries, fire prevention, etc.) as it concentrates solely on CPR, the signs and symptoms of a heart attack, how to deal with an unconscious person, and recognising a cardiac arrest.

Let the Office have your name if you'll be there. Everyone should attend!!

Richard Triggs's remarkable panorama captures Mercia Marina's unique environment. Eight years on from it's opening, the maturing trees and shrubs soften the contours, add tone and texture to the mirrored water and frame the grassy slopes. Before the Marina, there was a flooded gravel pit and whilst the development's primary goal was a Marina, a key objective has always been to "maximise the wildlife value and habitat diversity through targeted management [and a] commitment to establishing and improving habitats in non-operational areas that will encourage wildlife and enhance the local area.". The wildlife surveys done before the development began found some tadpoles, a frog and a couple of pipistrelle bats along with farmyard and song birds with a few visiting wetland birds. It was a pretty barren stretch of land and water. Expertise, time, commitment and significant investment has enabled a remarkable microsite to develop - one that has just earned a Gold David Bellamy Conversation Award for the sixth year running. We have done regular surveys of waterfowl, bats, butterflies and song birds. A recent, and continuing, focus has been on bumblebees and includes setting up a volunteer group "Save Our Bees" which has raised many hundreds of pounds to support the Bumblebee Conservation Trust and the Derbyshire Wildlife Trust and we have also been busy with bee-friendly planting in designated areas around the Marina. A new focus is on small mammals. Neil and Jane Wakeham recently attended a three-day training course on Identifying Small Land Mammals'. Not just a case of seeing something and saying "Oh, look, a mouse, must be a house mouse". No, as you would expect things are a bit more complicated. They learnt live trapping, weighing, sexing, breeding condition and keeping a close track on all traps. And they learnt the licensing laws which included the necessary recording and reporting to 'The Derbyshire Mammal Group'.

Means of identification such as tracks, kills, smell, sound, droppings and scratch marks were also practised. Yes, before anyone asks they did have to handle droppings and scrutinise them through a magnify. What fun! The types of small mammals trapped included Bank & Field Voles, Wood Mice, Pygmy and Common Shrews. Others identified by different methods included rabbits, squirrels, fox, badger and bats (although there is a separate bat course). While many small mammals look similar there are definite identifying features such as ears, colour, tail size, habitat and eating patterns.

They came away not only competent in live trapping and identification but also raring to get stuck in and find out exactly what is here on the marina and how best to protect and conserve all our mammals as each one has a part to play in the biodiversity of the area.

We have some very diverse habitats here which are essential. Our hedgerows with their wide variety of trees and shrubs will be used by some animals as green corridors, others will eat there, some pass through, or simply live there. It will encourage insects and butterflies which in turn will help the bird population. Neil and Jane have been live trapping behind some of our hedges – a fantastic area for our small mammals. They trapped a goodly number of Bank Voles, all very healthy, great news. They've also seen evidence of Field Voles - a stash of bitten grass in a concealed run. Also sadly a dead Field Vole which had been killed by a Weasel or Stoat. All these creatures form a large part of the food chain. They trapped in some woodland and had three wood mice. This was good as one was a juvenile male and another was a pregnant female. The third was a mature female. Again all in really good condition with big black eyes, large ears and extremely lively. They can only live trap until the end of the month so not much time left. However they also have a camera trap which they can continue to use. There are many other ways to track and identify mammals so they will be busy all year round. The Marina is happy to support all this work - both directly and indirectly.

The Piazza

A planning application was submitted at the beginning of September for a new building on the promontory to replace the pub tower which was originally put forward six years ago, the Boardwalk building having been completed two years ago. The proposed building, to be called The Piazza, is for offices, a restaurant and shops. Indications are that approval will be granted as the local authority are very keen to attract quality professional employment in the offices to South Derbyshire and the building is similar to that which was previously approved. The development mooted six years ago had - as a centrepiece - the pub, which was always part of the marina's development plans. As the nature and popularity of pubs has changed so dramatically since the marina was planned, the Piazza will consist of a restaurant, shops and offices. The exact numbers and sizes are yet to be determined. If things go according to plan, work on site will commence in March 2017 for completion in December.
