Tony Preston introduced the evening, welcoming everyone - old and new - and Louise Davies, coordinator of the marina's events programme, took over and talked about this, introducing groups' leaders along the way.


It was a lovely evening and a great demonstration of how strong a community we have become.





Pontoon Fireboards

Diesel heaters are increasingly common on boats and do their job well but you need be aware that the exhaust gasses are very hot and exit on the side of the boat. If your boat has been moved in the recent shuffle, have

you checked whether your jetty has a fibre cement board fitted? Have you left a gap to allow the gasses to escape up the (correct!) side of the fitted fireboard. If you don't have a fireboard fitted, please let the Office know and this will be done for you if you don't want to take the board



and do it yourself. There is a real danger of fire on the jetties from these exhausts so please check if you've moved to a new mooring.

At the beginning of the summer, Lucy Elson and Louise Davies chose this piece of sculpture by Paul Margetts. Since then, "The Flying Geese" were in the Marina Office for people to see but they have now been installed in Wildlife Pond by Callum & Tony. A beautiful setting for a great piece of art.

Findern Playing Field Project

The Marina works closely with its neighbours and particularly with Willington and Findern villages. For instance, we are an active participant in the Willington Arts Festival, we work with Findern Footpaths Group on environmental projects, we host the Findern Primary School sponsored walks and we welcome the local community to a number of our events. Right now, there is a very practical and easy way for us to help a local project which will be of enormous benefit to the local children. All each of us has to do - should we choose to - is cast a vote.

Findern Playing Field - on the west side of the village off Hillside - has a little playground in the corner which is rather sorry for itself and out of date (see picture). Deciding to do something about it, a

> local group got together to apply for refurbishment grants, starting with the baby/toddler area. Given the number of projects nowadays applying for

grants, they deserve huge congratulations that they've been shortlisted for two grants. And this is where you could come in.

For Groundwork/Tesco Bags of Help vote for the Findern Project in the Mickleover Tesco store between the Monday 31st October to Sunday

at Mickleover Tesco 13th November. You can vote with each transaction in store throughout that two weeks. The project with the most votes over the 2 weeks gets awarded the full £12,000. If you use that Tescos any-

way, it'll be easy! The second grant application was to the Aviva Community Fund and, again, the project was shortlisted. To be awarded a grant needs lots of votes and this is done online at https://community-fund.aviva.co.uk/voting/project/view/16-2602. You

VOTE FOR FINDERN

The village has a growing number of young families whose needs are not currently being met. The planning group are also working with the local Findern Footpaths Group to incorporate a Wildlife Area/Garden with insect hotels, a butterfly bund, bee attracting flowers and work to establish wild orchids, wild iris and the "Fynderne Flower" (a type of daffodil). The current site is used by responsible dog walkers and this would continue. The project was initiated by feedback from the local community and they are proud to be working together to make a real difference which will deliver a huge benefit.

There will also be a bus shelter at the stop on the Marina side - it isn't possible to have one on the other side because the ground falls away too guickly. There's no word yet from Trent Barton about what fare stage these will be. As many know, the Burton direction fare is cheaper from the stop near-

er Willington and going in the Derby direction is cheaper from the Everglades stop. The 'fare boundary' is more or less at the Marina! But the two existing stops will remain, which means there won't be an increase in travel costs. And a big thankyou to the Marina for being a major contributor to all the costs and for spending a great deal of time in discussions to win the necessary agreements from both Trent Barton
