Tillerettes





contact with their Tillerettes and putting plans in place for getting together, we had a group session on Friday, 24 February in the Willow Tree Tea Rooms. The Agenda was "Know Your Boat". Since each and every boat is different from every other (!), the only efficient way of doing this was as a group with a Q&A panel discussion. Four of the Mentors were there, adding experience and expertise. The three Panellists are known to us all and are hugely experienced boaters and enormously knowledgeable about boaty bits that move or don't move, make a noise or are silent and - importantly - which bit should do what! They dealt with a wide range of questions and issues which meant an excellent evening with good humour, lots of discussion and people getting to know people.

The Wildlife in Spring



We could claim Spring began on the 22 of February 2017 as this was the first 7am sunrise. Or a month later on the 19th of March as this is the day the astronomical winter ends. But March 1 marks the first day of meteorological, or climatological, spring for the Northern Hemisphere so it's fair to say Spring has now officially sprung - as nicely shown by Sue Jordan's lovely photograph!

There is a new arrangement of the Marina's wildlife groups. The Nature Society is the 'umbrella' and within are groups focussed on Small Mammals, Bees and Pollinators and Birds. Jane Wakeham explains further:

NATURE SOCIETY Making a real difference

February 5th saw the launch of a new Wildlife Group at the Marina. "The Nature Society is not for the benefit of the Marina but for the benefit of all of us who live here. It is ours and we can take full ownership of it. So

why society? A society is a 'community with common aims & interests' so a good name for those who have a love of nature and a desire to help improve biodiversity and conservation. Built into us all is a link to our wild heritage, even if we choose to ignore it. But as we live the middle of a conservation area it is hoped that we do appreciate all it has to offer.

What the Nature Society is NOT, is about enrolling in groups, getting more involved than you want to and feeling obliged to join in. The idea behind 'The Nature Society' is for all to get enjoyment from living in a wildlife rich area. Giving a little bit of time to im-



proving the biodiversity, encouraging and helping with the conservation of our local wildlife. If your circumstances do not allow getting hands on, no matter, the idea is that you can enjoy what is being done or better still if you have

knowledge of certain aspects of nature/wildlife then help all those who also have an interest by sharing that knowledge, even with just a chat over a cuppa. Butterfly Nursery, Natures Highway and Hazel Copse are just some of the projects planned and these will be starting over the next few weeks. Keep eyes open for announcements. All information and Newsletters will be available on the Mercia Marina website under Wildlife."

CAN YOU HELP? Butterflies are in desperate decline and need as much help as they can get. So we will be taking part in weekly butterfly counts soon and some volunteers to help would be greatly appreciate. Help & training will be given. Results will be submitted to the butterfly recorder for Derbyshire. If you'd like to be involved, give your name to the Office and we will be in touch.



RED MASON BEE PROJECT

Red mason bees are only active from April to mid-June. They are docile little bees, not given to stinging and are safe around children



and pets. Like all bees only the female carries a sting and it is said that the only way she will sting you is if you catch her and roll her between your fingers. Like many of our bees they are badly affected by habitat loss and pesticides. They are excellent pollinators of fruit

trees and soft fruits. With the new foraging walk full of fruit this is good news for us as well as them. So important are they, in the future they may be reared commercially to pollinate fruit orchards in the UK.

Soon you may see a new type of bee nests going up near the fruit trees behind the wildflower drift, and in the cottage garden. These contain a release chamber into which we will be putting some mason bee cocoons. Ron Rock of the Bumblebee Conservation Trust is supplying these to us. From these the males will emerge a couple of weeks before the females. The males will patrol the entrance to the release chamber waiting for the females. They mate and the

females immediately set to work establishing a nest. They will use the special tubes in the bee nests to lay their eggs. Each one will be sealed with mud. Pollen and nectar is taken into the nests to feed the larvae which hatch after about a week. They then spin a cocoon before



turning into an adult bee. They will remain in the cocoon until the following spring. All the males die after six weeks and the females by mid-June. No red mason bee lives to see its own offspring. In October/November we will be removing the cocoons, cleaning them to remove mites and storing over winter to be put out into the release chambers next year. The nests will be taken down, cleaned and fitted with new tubes and put out again the following spring

We plan to run workshops when we remove the cocoons so anyone interested to see what it is all about will be welcome to come along. It is fascinating.




The Derbyshire Gold Card

The Gold Card Scheme is a travel and discount scheme administered by Derbyshire County Council. The Scheme allows eligible people access to free travel on selected bus and train services and other TRAVEL, DISCOUNT AND LIBRARY CARD benefits as detailed. Eligibility is based on age which is related to the State Pension Age, excepting those who with certain disabilities, who may qualify sooner. Further information about how the scheme operates, some frequently asked questions and the application form are available on the Derbyshire County Council website (www.south-derbys.gov.uk/transport_and_streets/public_transport/ the derbyshire gold card/default.asp)

> There is an agreed procedure with Derbyshire County Council and, therefore, South Derbyshire District Council, by which eligible Marina residents can get their Gold Card. You can apply by post or - which the majority of people do - in person at the South Derbyshire District Council offices in Civic Way, Swadlincote. You should complete the application form, take it, your photograph (or they can take that for you at the Office), the proof of age eligibility (driving licence, passport, medical card) and the proof that you are living in Derbyshire.

> For this residency proof you need a "to whom it may concern" statement from the Marina Office that you (name and boat name) have a Residential Mooring (don't lose the original - it may be useful elsewhere). The Office will do your letter for you. The Marina statement is backed up with your electoral registration and, as it is a legal requirement to register on the electoral roll of the authority where you live,

you should already have done this. You can take your letter of acceptance on the electoral role if you want but there's no need; South Derbyshire District Council staff can do the check on their system while you're there. Provided you are eligible, your form is in order, you are on the electoral roll and you have the documents as described, you will then be issued with a 5-year card.



The Piazza building work will begin in March. When completed, the new addition to The Boardwalk will house a restaurant, shops and additional office space. The Piazza will be built in a similar style and materials to The Boardwalk, which was named Britain's Best Small Commercial Building at the Grand Final of the Local Authority Building Control (LABC) Building Excellence Awards 2015. It had previously been the overall winner of all categories at the East Midlands regional LABC event. The three-storey building will border the area surrounding the marina's unique five-sided bandstand. This means, of course, that for

much of this year the Bandstand and the area around can't be used for events. But the Marina is exploring ways to keep the markets and busking going through the coming months, so do watch out for notices both on the Marina's Facebook page and poster displays around the Marina. And, before you ask, all the trees and plants, the willow arch and the water rill are being dismantled/removed very carefully and replaced/replanted in other areas of the Marina. Everything is being kept!!

Bicycles
