

## Falling in the Water is No Joke

At the beginning of May, one of our oldest residents (Denis) fell and tumbled down the embankment and into the water by FB1. Sarah glimpsed his fall - having just seen him at the top of the bank - and when she got to where he was, she saw him unconscious with his face under water. She jumped in (the water is just a few feet deep near the bank), lifted his shoulders to keep his head out of the water and shouted loudly for help. Helped by Marina staff and moorers, he was lifted out of the water (having regained consciousness), attended by the parademics who'd been called immediately and was taken to hospital accompanied by Sarah when he said he would like someone with him. Thankfully he was back on the Marina a few days later. Sarah, Tony Preston, Robert Neff, Kath, those who took Tess (Sarah's dog) for a walk whilst she accompanied him to hospital, Carol for feeding Sarah when she got back. These were the 'key' people involved but many others

helped and Denis, and the rest of us, are all grateful to be part of a community where help is right along-

side you whenever you may need it.

With the arrival of spring and summer, many of us are taking boats out, working on boats, fishing, and generally being out and about around water. A slip or trip that takes you into that water is not to be taken lightly. Hopefully, it will be a far less serious incident that Denis's. But we should all remember that water is cold and if you are in it for any period of time or don't remove wet clothing/wrap in warm blanket etc. straight afterwards then there is a danger of hypothermia.

But most immediate dangers are cold shock and confusion, panic and hyperventilation. People on the Marina who have fallen in all say this is exactly what they experienced. So don't treat such an accident lightly. Do call for help (an ambulance if it's serious) and call our First Aiders for support and advice.

If you're out on the cut - and in many places on the Marina, the water may only be chest deep. On the Marina there are whistles and fire sirens at the end of pontoons. Use them if you need them - that's what they're there for. If you're out on the cut, you will probably be able to stand up and walk about while you plan how to get out of the canal. Does your boat carry safety equipment? Do you know how to use it? Perhaps one of the updated versions of the plank with a ramp one side and ladder steps the other would be a useful addition to your equipment.? Or you could walk/wade to the nearest bridge 'ole and lift your bum out backwards onto the stones. Don't let people grab your arms and

drag you up the bank or over the Armco - you may well suffer



injuries from this sort of 'help'. Then get warm, change clothes, shower or get a bowl of hot water for your feet and hands. These are just very brief points about falling in the water brought on by Sarah and Denis's experience. Please think about it, read up on it, plan what you would do if it was you or someone beside you who fell in. It's potentially anything but a joke!




## **NATURE SOCIETY** Making a real difference

Floating Market: The Traders said the Market was worthwhile and they were glad to come.






## Mercia Events During the Summer
