## Liveaboard Boat Insurance



Do you have a residential mooring and do you live on your boat? If so, are you sure you have the right level of insurance. 'Regular' narrow/widebeam insurance policies tend to be for leisure users and these may not be

giving you enough cover and you may be missing out assist on associated benefits.



INSURANCE SERVICES LTD A good liveaboard insurance policy gives alternative accommodation if the boat becomes uninhabitable, gives lock and key replacement, insurance for personal property away from the boat (to certain agreed limits), cov-

er on portable electronic equipment (laptops, tablets, ipads, phones and cameras), cover for credit cards and cash, pedal cycles and solar panels. There may be no excess

payable if the loss or damage occurs when the boat is on its mooring at the Marina. And what about hull surveys on older craft? At least one company



will only ask for a hull survey on a 30-year old boat and then only every five years which can be varied by two years to coincide with blacking. So check your insurance carefully. Is it right for you

and does it cover what you need it to cover?

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# Archaeology at Mercia - The 2017 Excavation

The Archaeological dig in the fields on the west side of the Marina has been completed. It was the latest in a series of explorations which are a necessary and preliminary part of any approved developments on the site. The first was some 40 years ago in preparation for the gravel extraction associated with the construction of the A50; the 2008 dig - preceding the building of the Marina focussed on a trench, a pit and an area to the east side of the flooded quarry. Each dig excavated archaeological remains from most prehistory periods - the Paleolithic, Mesolithic, Neolithic, Bronze and Iron Ages. There were stone tools, flints, pits, ring ditches, post holes, linear boundary features and ceramics. The current plan for the new lodges, the pond and landscaping in the two fields therefore brought the Archaeological Research Services, with Assistant Project Officer Caitlin Halton, back on site to confirm the known archaeology and to record any new archaeology from several small digs within the area. The top soil in the fields is guite thick and the development is relatively shallow so there was no need to dig down more than about half a metre - which meant not going below the Romano-British remains.

The known line of pits across the field was confirmed, though their purpose remains unknown (perhaps waste pits or boundary markers) and there was evidence of post holes in other areas. A piece of Roman ceramic building material was recovered. Given the acidic nature of the soil, any animal matter would have decayed so there were no animal or other bones to find to help decide what might have been going on in the area.

Such explorations are necessary activities even though, in this case, nothing new or surprising was discovered. It adds to the general knowledge of the area and, for us - perhaps - a more immediate awareness of what is under our feet. Go far enough down and you'll hit the marina's bedrock of Mercia Mudstone – formed during the Triassic period when all around us was desert!

# Strong Winds, Storms and Boat Safety

As ex-Hurricane Ophelia was heading our way back in the middle of October (and then we had our own Brian soon after), Rob McLean of the Boat Safety Scheme wrote a timely reminded and warning how wind and rain can threaten both us and our boats in several ways. With his full permission, I quote:

Stoves - in strong gusty winds your stove can suffer from two opposite effects -

1. Back-draughting - Combustion fumes are blown back down the flue and forced out of the stove chamber. Make sure your fire is burning well (but not too strongly – see below) and that the upwards draw is maintained. Make sure you have a chimney terminal atop the roof, this will help with the draw. 2. Over-firing – where the stove races away. Don't overbank the stove and leave it unattended. Don't leave the air controls open (or the door open - never do that) and leave the stove. The fire and heat can pick up in a moment. In both cases, tarry chimney pipes can both reduce the upward flow of gases and the deposits can catch fire (chimney fires). If this happens the heat can radiate to other parts of boat and decorations around the stove. A completely burnt out boat can result.

Your belt and braces lifesaver if, despite your carefulness, the worst happens will be working Smoke and Carbon Monoxide alarms. For further information about types and options, have a look at the web pages (the links are a Facebook redirection) www.boatsafetyscheme.org/.../choosing-a-smoke-alarm/ and www.boatsafetyscheme.org/.../co-alarms-save-lives/ You should be checking these regularly to make sure they are working properly but an extra check or two throughout stormy conditions is no bad thing! The other risks to plan for

Trees – keep a 'weather' eye on any trees by or above your boat! Check for any branches likely to drop or split boughs.

Rapidly rising/falling water levels – also strong stream flows – with both of these check your mooring pins and ropes ahead of the storm hitting.

Moorings - strong winds can move the boat quite significantly so check your ropes and mooring pins frequently. Plan ahead, avoid having to navigate in strong stream and high wind conditions – get your water/fuel/gas in stock; and if you need to, empty your over-full holding tanks before it arrives

# Don't Drink and Drive



Even though the perimeter road around the Marina is a private road, that only goes as far as the green electric security gates. Outside of those, the road is considered a public road. The police say they would happily act within the Marina on information given to them. And, if people report to the Office that Mercians are driving whilst intoxicated, the Office has a duty to take action to prevent harm to people.
