Cruising 2018

SHARING YOUR KNOWLEDGE: The cruising season is upon us. liveaboards and leisure moorers begin to head out in May -



some for a couple or three weeks, others for a month or two and some not planning to be back at Mercia until the end of the summer. This time last year the weather was lovely (see left, us moored with friends at the bottom of Bosley Locks on the Macclesfield). Whatever it does this year doesn't really matter that much; being out on the boat is glorious in itself!

You may be planning a route you've not done before and it's worth taking some advice and asking around about moorings, shopping, things to look out for, etc. You will have either Nicholson's or Pearson's (or both!) with you but recent knowledge from our own boaters is hugely useful. Mercia Community Facebook page would be a good place to ask for tips and advice. Or just ask around near

your mooring. Another place for plenty of tips and advice is the online electronic towpath (Canal World Discussion Forum - canalworld.net). Ask the question in the "Waterways Holidays" section or just read through the stories already there. And for those who are already very familiar with huge swathes of our inland waters, do be generous with your knowledge - share your notes scribbled in Nicholsons or a link to your cruising blog. It makes an big difference to know, particularly, good overnight moorings, great pubs, working services etc. And, indeed, what time it's advisable to get to certain moorings if you want to be reasonably certain of a spot!

OPEN CANAL MAP: A new development in maps is an electronic canal and rivers' map which is receiving a lot of praise and support. It has been developed by Tom Sapey and built originally using Canal and River Trust Open Data. Tom was boating last

year and the pages he needed in Nicholsons were all stuck together, so he tried to navigate using the CRT website and Google maps. That didn't work particularly well so, on discovering the CRT open data website, Tom experimented with loading it into Google maps. He published it on some Facebook groups and the response was amazing so, since he was a programmer/ web developer who has been a boater for 10 years, he reckoned there was something missing from the boating world.



Lots was missing from that original version but people were asked to contribute and suggest amendments, information that should be included etc. and now, twelve months' on, there is a

more complex and complete map. Over 800 user generated markers have been added plus a couple of thousand from other websites who have contacted Tom offering him their data.

The android app came next which offers a faster interface and the iPhone app will follow later on this year. You can also explore it in a normal browser. Have a look at the website (**opencanalmap.uk**) and if you've an android phone, download the app so it's to hand when you're off cruising. It's a very promising new resource which Tom updates regularly in response to the suggestions he receives. Thank you, Tom, for spending so much time and giving, particularly the teckies amongst us, such a useful bit of kit. Do have a look at it and if, as you cruise, there are things you think could be added, then fill in the form and let Tom know.

PRE-CRUISING CHECKLIST: Some people are great believers in lists and even when going on holiday to the same place or going off, again, on their boat, grab the checklist just to make sure nothing's been forgotten. Nigel Hunt has his pre-cruise check



list which he's happy to share with us: 1) Check batteries (starter and domestic), make sure they're topped up and holding a charge; 2) Top up stern greaser tube; 3) Check hose and hose fittings; 4) Take spares (fan belts, grease for the stern greaser, engine and gearbox oil; 5) If you have a tall mooring chimney, swap it for the shorter cruising chimney; 6) Top up with water, diesel, fuel for the fire; 7) Check gas cylinders. Next, in terms of things to take there's 1) windlasses and gloves; 2) lump hammer; 3) mooring stakes/chains; 4)

BW key and handcuff key; 5) anchor, chain and rope (depending on where your cruise takes you; 6) sharp knife or Prop Mate for defouling prop. You will want to create your own list and there may well be an additional set of requirements if you're heading for the Thames or cruising on or across other rivers.

Finally, Nigel says remember to be careful about using power hungry appliances! Leave the microwave and kettle alone, don't use the washing machine or hair dryer unless the engine is running and has had a chance to recharge the batteries after a night stop. And if your freezer not full at times, fill the gaps with plastic containers or clean packets ... it will run more efficiently
